Participating in a Virtual Children's Hearing



Welcome

Sometimes Children's Hearings can be held virtually. This might mean some people join it using technology, while others are in the Hearing room.

Sometimes, everyone will join in virtually.

If this is the case, it is a little bit different than attending a face to face Children's Hearing.

This guide will help you prepare to participate in your child's Hearing virtually.

Before a Virtual Hearing

It's really important you take part in your Virtual Hearing if you can, as decisions can be made about your child.

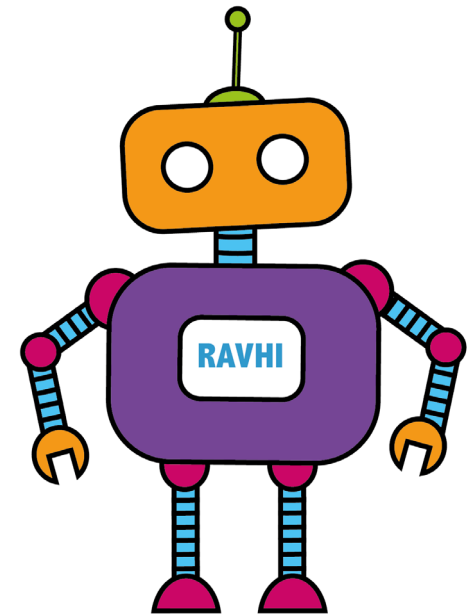
You will be attending your Hearing using Microsoft Teams. You will get a letter giving you information about this.



About a week before, you will be contacted about doing a test.

Two days before your child's Virtual Hearing is due to take place, you will receive your joining instructions to attend virtually – these are sent to your email address.

This is RAVHI the robot. They will guide you through your Virtual Hearing. Whenever you see RAVHI, you will know help is available.



Getting help

If you are unsure about joining the Virtual Hearing or have any questions, please get someone to help you. You can talk to a lawyer or your social worker.

During the Virtual Hearing

If your child is very young, they won't be asked to join the Virtual Hearing. Older children and young people can attend and they are encouraged to take part.

During the children's hearing, only one person speaks at a time. Everyone else listens to what they have to say.

Your views

The panel members will ask everyone what they think and feel. People will take it in turns to say what they think and feel. The panel members will get a chance to ask everyone questions.

You will get the chance to say what you think and feel.

After listening to everyone the panel members will make a decision about your child. They will explain their decision. Then they will explain your rights.

After the Hearing

If you have questions about the decision the panel members make, you can speak to your social worker, lawyer or the person that is helping you.

If you are not happy, you have the right to appeal the decision. You should speak to a lawyer about this.
